Established to be celebrated for the first time on November 26, 1789, Washington declared Thanksgiving as a national holiday to give "thanks" for the Constitution. Yes, that is the true meaning of Thanksgiving.

The Constitution has 4440 words, and was signed on September 17, 1787. This makes the US Constitution the oldest and shortest written constitution for any major government in the world. It also gives us another holiday: Constitution Day, which is celebrated every September 17th.
