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
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Stories From Around the Department

Neurosurgery Summer 2012 Mentoring Program

As summer gets close to its end, one thing that begins at the same period is the school year. Children and young adults of all ages prepare themselves for another year of studying, taking notes, tests, and more tests. Thankfully, these students have had a summer holiday to relax and prepare for this strenuous task of education. Well, most of them have this opportunity....

Our department has been hosting two local high school students for a summer mentoring program. That's right, instead of taking time off to relax, two ambitious high school students decided to study even more. Armaity Minwalla, a senior at



University Liggett School, and Maggie Kelly, a senior at Grosse Pointe North High School both spent time learning about our clinical and research programs with our faculty and residents.

Armaity and Maggie, who can be seen in the surrounding photos, spent time exploring a variety of subjects. These included:

Clinical



• Observing a craniotomy with Dr. Steve Ham, Chief of Neurosurgery at CHM, and Dr. Kwasi Nyame, one of our residents.

• Took rounds with Dr. Narayanan to look over interventional neurosurgical patients, and also observed Dr. Narayanan in the OR. • Dr. Nyame also took Armaity and Maggie to the Skull Base Cadaver Lab, where they were able to learn about cadaver dissection.

Research

- In the lab of Yuchuan Ding, the girls assisted with a project that looked at the acute administration of ethanol and its effect on brain injury. They assisted with the test expression of genes and proteins.
- Maggie and Armaity spent time in Saroj Mathupala's lab preparing protein extracts from brain tumor cell cultures through the use of a protein binding dye and polyacrylamide gel



electrophoresis (PAGE). Through these processes, they were able to help identify a specify protein within the tumor cells.

• Finally, within the lab of Alana Conti, the two students helped examine the role of the enzymes adenylyl cyclase 1 and 8 in methamphetamine neurotoxicity.

Wow, what a summer. As for myself, I would have just read a book or two and slept in. However, it's certain that with this sort of work effort, these two young women have a promising future. Thanks, Armaity and Maggie, for sharing part of your summer with us!

Ovarian cancer strikes over 22,000 women in the United States each year, and over 15,000 will die from the disease each year.

What makes this even more shocking is that ovarian cancer is highly treatable if detected early. However, the ability to do so is difficult due to non-specific symptoms and the lack of available early detection testing.

- 5. Give me a Shakespeare work that starts with the letter M. Much Ado About Nothing


6. What was the name of Tina Turner's character in the seminal Australian action film, Mad Max Beyond
